HERITAGE VOLUNTEERS

The Heritage Volunteers have been working at Boughton House at Geddington for a number of years.

Initially they were conserving ie. cleaning and repairing, the books in the Library. Mostly 18th and 18th century leather bound volumes. They then moved into the North Passage, a passageway between the medieval and 17th century House, reputed to be haunted, working on the less valuable books and Estate archives They didn't see any ghosts!

They have had a number of training days from Caroline Bendix, learning various techniques and improving skills.

They have been working under the Buccleuch archivist, Crispin Powell and when they had finished the books project they were then asked to conserve the Music Archive. This is an internationally renowned archive of early, mainly English and Scottish music, under the protection of Paul Bucher, the Buccleuch Music Archivist.

They have now moved on to a new project, under Crispin, transcribing the letters of Duchess Charlotte Ann, who lived through most of the 19th century. This lady had the most awful handwriting which they have really struggled to transcribe, a very slow but interesting process. However, they are now coming towards the end of that project and Crispin has mentioned other projects that he would like them to attempt.

All the people who work at Boughton have been very friendly, welcoming and encouraging and they enjoy their time there.

The greatest plea I can make to you is get involved. Whether joining the committee to keep the society going and ensure we put on what interests you, making suggestions for lectures/ events, recruitment of new members.
